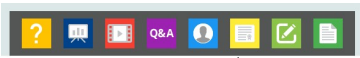

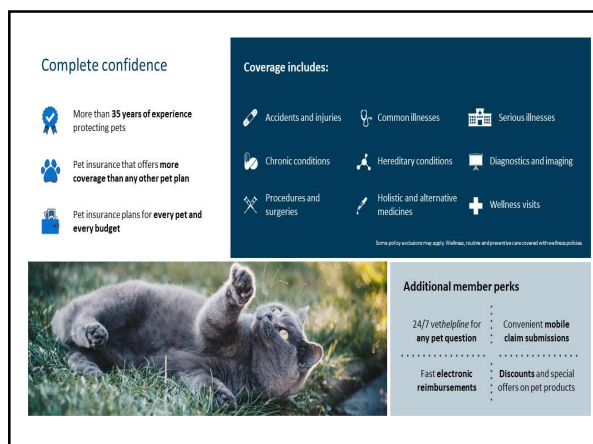

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Household Toxins

- General household cleaners
- Corrosive products
 - Acid vs alkali cleaners
 - Phenols
 - Detergents
- Objects around the home
- Common household plants






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Household Cleaners

- Multi-surface cleaners, glass cleaners, floor cleaners, etc.
- Surfactants: typically non-ionic or anionic
- Alcohols: ethanol, rubbing alcohol
- Mild irritants: dermal and gastric



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Aerosolized Products

- Mild irritants
 - If large amount sprayed on a patient, then potential for more severe clinical signs.
- Serious concern for avian patients
- Consider ventilation or fresh air



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Acids

- Toilet bowl cleaners, carpet cleaners, tub and tile cleaners, mold removers, drain openers, rust stain removers.
- Immediate pain-may limit exposure
- Damage seen at <pH 2, potentially pH 3
- Mechanism: Coagulation type necrosis with destruction of surface epithelium and submucosa.

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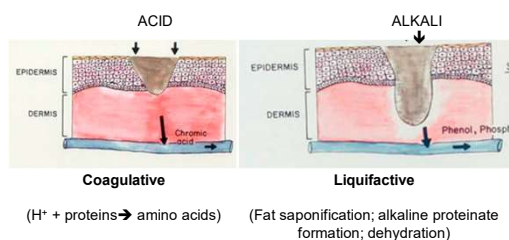


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Alkalis

- Drain openers, oven or grill cleaners, hair removal products, toilet bowl cleaners
- Sodium hydroxide
- Delayed pain can lead to more serious exposures
- Damage seen at >pH 11
- Mechanism: Forms hydroxide ions on contact with water causing liquefaction necrosis

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Drain Openers

- Sodium hydroxide pH >12
- Hydrochloric acid pH <1
- Licking shower drain
- Symptoms:
 - Holding tongue out
 - Pain
 - Ulcers
 - Salivation
 - Vomiting
 - Hematemesis



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Bleach



- Sodium hypochlorite
- Severity can depend on pH and concentration
- Household bleach 5-10%
- Industrial bleach 25%
- Local tissue damage, systemic symptoms not expected
- Inhalation is general irritant
- Combining with acidic or ammonia based cleaners produces chlorine and chloramine gas, respectively

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Phenols



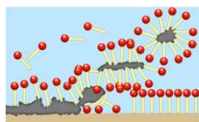
- Carboic acid, hexachlorophene, chlorophenol, phenylic acid, phenyl hydroxide, hydroxybenzene, oxybenzene
- Household disinfectants, medicated shampoos, throat sprays, mouth wash
- Corrosive injury at >5% dermal exposure. Some degree of dermal absorption
- Water evaporates faster than phenol causing delayed toxicity as phenol concentrates
- Mechanism: Rapidly denatures proteins, exact mechanism is unknown

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Quaternary Ammonia Compounds



- Detergents, fabric softeners, liquid potpourri, hot spot sprays
- Cationic surfactants have a neutral pH
- Mechanism: Cationic detergents cause local irritation or corrosive effects by disrupting the lipid bilayer of cellular membranes
- Systemic toxicity with CNS depression has been reported but uncommon in veterinary patients.

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Pod Detergents

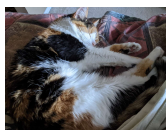


- pH ranges from 7 to 11
- Burst when bitten; leading to vomiting and bubbling in the back of the throat with soap bubbles getting into lungs
- Treatment for aspiration is supportive
- Ulcerative damage is not expected but reports of esophageal erosion have been noted in children.

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Dryer Sheets

- Can contain cationic detergents causing irritation and potential for corrosive injury when ingested
- When used in a dryer the components deteriorate with heat
- Ingestion of used dryer sheets is considered nontoxic
- FBO risk possible but low



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Treatment of Corrosives

- Oral
 - Do not induce emesis
 - No Activated Charcoal or UAA gel
 - Dilution such as flushing the mouth if asymptomatic and recent
 - GI protectants and antibiotics
 - Pain management
 - Endoscopy if severe
- Dermal
 - Dilution with tepid water for 15-20 minutes
 - Do not neutralize

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Batteries

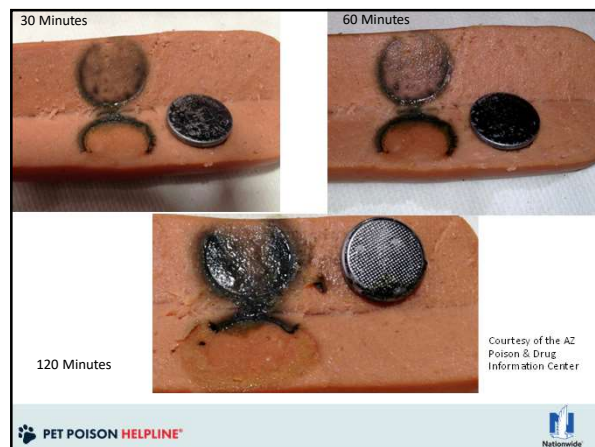
- Alkaline batteries: AA, AAA, C, D, 9v
 - Black material present when punctured
 - Metal casings-often pass through GIT fast enough to avoid toxicity.
- Lithium Ion Batteries
 - Not corrosive
 - Risk of lodging in esophageal folds
 - Current between battery and tissues can cause tissue damage, erosion, and possible perforation
- Treatment
 - Radiographs with neck views
 - Dilution and GI protectants



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Glue

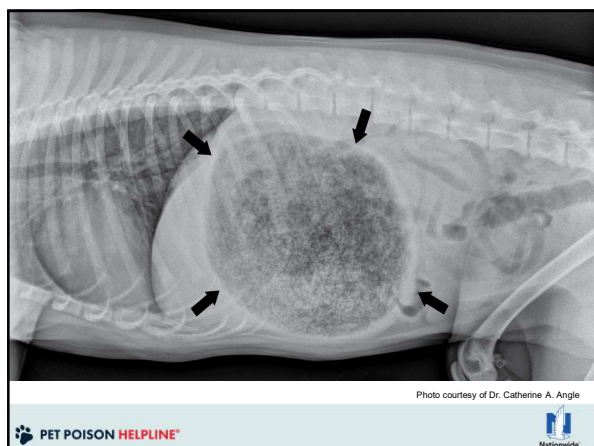
- Diisocyanate vs cyanoacrylate
 - Diisocyanate continues to expand in the stomach following ingestion.
 - Cyanoacrylate are local irritants but nonexpanding
- Not all Gorilla Glues are diisocyanates
- Treatment for diisocyanates
 - Radiographs: Mass visible 3-12 hours after ingestion has ingesta appearance.
 - Mass stops expanding after 12 hours



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Common Houseplants



- Jade plant (*Crassula* sp)
 - GI irritant
 - Depression and ataxia reported but not common
- Fiddle leaf fig, Weeping fig, (*Ficus* sp)
 - Sap causes dermal irritation and burning sensation
 - Salivation, vomiting, lethargy (self limiting)
- Holly (*Ilex* sp)
 - Vomiting, diarrhea (self limiting)
- Poinsettia (*Euphorbia pulcherrima*)
 - Sap causes irritation both dermal and GI
 - Dilution for dermal signs; GI signs (self limiting)

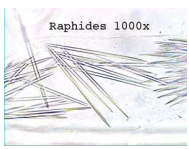


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Insoluble Calcium Oxalate Plants

- Not systemically toxic
- Examples:
 - Arrowhead vine (*Synonymum* sp)
 - Caladium (*Caladium* sp)
 - Calla lily (*Zantedeschia* sp)
 - Peace lily (*Spathiphyllum* sp)
 - Dumbcane (*Dieffenbachia* sp)
 - Philodendron (*Philodendron* sp)
 - Pothos (*Epipremnum* sp)
 - Chinese evergreen (*Azlaena commutatum*)
 - Umbrella plant (*Schefflera actinophylla*)
 - ZZ plant (*Zamioculcas zamiifolia*)
 - Fruit salad plant (*Monstera deliciosa*)
- Plant cells contain raphides which burst forth and spear the mucosa
- Oral pain, drooling, vomiting, change in voice
- Raphides bind to calcium containing foods.



Raphides 1000x

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Dracaena sp.

- Ingestion of saponins cause vomiting +/- blood, anorexia, hypersalivation, ataxia and weakness.
 - Cats: mydriatic, tachycardic and have abdominal pain.
- Examples:
 - Corn Plant
 - Lucky Bamboo
 - Madagascar Dragon Tree
 - Song of India
 - Janet Craig

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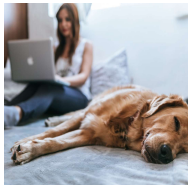
