- Fabric Softener
- Bleach
- Detergent pods

ATTIC/BASEMENT

- Mothballs
- Rodenticides
- Insecticides
- Paint

BATHROOM

- Prescription medications
- Acetaminophen
- Ibuprofen
- Vitamins and minerals
- Heart medications
- Antidepressants
- Caffeine pills
- Drain and toilet cleaners
- Ammonia
- Bleach
- Inhalers
- Lime and rust removers
- Cough/cold/decongestant medications

LIVING ROOM

- Household plants (kalanchoe, diffenbachia, Easter lily, cycad/sago palm)
- Liquid potpourri
- Batteries and devices such as remote controls and cell phones

GARAGE

- Ice melt products
- Antifreeze
- Windshield washer fluid
- Gasoline and kerosene
- Grub and snail bait
- Rodenticides
- Firecrackers
- Mothballs

KITCHEN

- Chocolate
- Macadamia nuts
- Grapes/raisins/currants
- Onion/garlic/chives
- Xylitol (sugar free gum or candy)

YARD & GARDEN

- Plants: autumn crocus; azalea; cycad/sago palms; foxglove; lily of the valley; oleander; rhododendron; spring bulbs (tulips, daffodils, hyacinth, etc.); true lilies and day lilies (*Lilium* and *Hermerocallis* spp.); yesterday, today, and tomorrow; yew
- Bone, blood, and feather meal
- Pest baits and repellents
